Our History

Universities New Zealand – Te Pōkai Tara was established as the New Zealand Vice-Chancellors' Committee by the Universities Act 1961, which replaced the federal University of New Zealand with separate institutions.

With the Education Amendment Act in 1990, the Vice-Chancellors' Committee assumed some of the statutory functions of the former University Grants Committee. These included quality assurance in universities and the administration of scholarships.



Our Name

The New Zealand Vice-Chancellors' Committee adopted the name Universities New Zealand—
Te Pōkai Tara in 2010. Our work has grown over time to include policy, advocacy and promotional functions in addition to our statutory roles.

While we retain the name New Zealand Vice-Chancellors' Committee in order to exercise our statutory functions and powers, the name Universities New Zealand–Te Pōkai Tara is our public face, as it more accurately conveys the role we play as the peak body representing New Zealand's eight universities.

Rather than being a direct translation, the Māori component of our name describes the essence of our work. Te Pōkai Tara represents a flock of Caspian Terns moving together, gathering and enveloping. It evokes a journey upwards and a connection with the source of knowledge and it carries with it a sense of the first rays of light at dawn. The visual imagery associated with our logo is derived from our Māori name.

How We Work

Universities New Zealand—Te Pōkai Tara (Universities NZ) is the peak body representing New Zealand's universities in the public interest, both nationally and internationally. The eight universities, represented by their Vice-Chancellors, make up the membership of Universities NZ. The Vice-Chancellors meet on a formal basis six times a year.

Universities NZ works through a small team based in Wellington and has delegated a number of functions to a range of committees generally consisting of a representative from each university. In addition Universities NZ convenes working parties and expert groups to address specific issues affecting universities.

Within its overall mission Universities NZ has a number of key roles. These include advice to government and its agencies, approval and moderation procedures for academic programmes in universities, administration and development of over forty national scholarships for undergraduate and postgraduate study and the generic promotion of the country's universities, both in New Zealand and internationally.

Other important functions of Universities NZ are the co-ordination of university research policy, facilitating Māori academic advancement, fostering internationalisation of education, maintaining international links through such bodies as the Association of Commonwealth Universities, surveying graduate outcomes and nominating university representatives to outside organisations.



Associated With Us

Academic Quality Agency for New Zealand Universities (AQA)

The AQA audits academic quality of the universities and promotes quality enhancement initiatives. The AQA governing board is appointed by Universities NZ.

Chancellors

The Chancellors of the universities meet three times a year, as a group and with Universities NZ.

New Zealand Universities Superannuation Scheme (NZUSS)

Established by the universities, the NZUSS has more than 7,000 members.
