

**Entrance level qualifications
for admission *ad eundem statum*
to New Zealand universities**

Country	Qualification
Australia	Year 12 completed at an acceptable level.
Canada	<i>Ontario</i> : Ontario Secondary School Diploma, 65% overall grade. <i>Quebec</i> : Grade 12 Certificate, 60% across 6 subjects including English; First year of CEGEP, 60% across 6 subjects including English. Full CEGEP acceptable as long as it includes English, with a 60% average overall.
Indonesia	At least one year of successful study at an Indonesian university.
Kenya	Kenya Certificate of Secondary Education completed with a B average grade.
Malaysia	STPM: 3 Principal passes.
Netherlands	VWO
Samoa	University Preparatory Year completed with a minimum B3 (60%) average over 8 papers, which must include English.
Singapore	H levels: a minimum of 2 H2 passes and a third pass at H1 or H2 level, plus at least on E grade in N-level/O-level mathematics or additional mathematics.
South Pacific countries: Kiribati Solomon Islands Tonga Vanuatu	South Pacific Form Seven Certificate: 3 or more B grades plus a grade 5 or better in PSSC English and a grade 6 or better in PSSC mathematics.
United States of America	High School Diploma plus an acceptable score in SAT.

International qualifications	
International Baccalaureate (IB)	A complete diploma of 24 points is required for admission.
Cambridge Assessment International Education (CAIE) or Advanced International Certification of Education (AICE)*	A or AS levels: a minimum of 120 points on the New Zealand CAIE Tariff from any syllabus groups which are broadly equivalent to those in the list of approved subjects for NCEA and a D grade or better from at least three difference syllabus groups (excluding Thinking Skills). Plus literacy (an E grade or better in AS English Language, English Language and Literature, English Literature or English General Paper) and numeracy (a D grade or better in IGCS or GCSE mathematics or any mathematics passed at AS level).

*NB: These are not the A and AS level examinations offered in the UK and this ruling does NOT apply to those examinations.
