INFORMATION FOR CANDIDATES

This document is a guide to the application and selection process for the Rhodes Scholarship. Please read this carefully to make sure that you are applying to the right constituency and meet all of the eligibility criteria. You will also find important information about how to apply and what you will need to submit an application.

This information is for candidates applying to the 2026 Rhodes Scholarship through the New Zealand constituency, for entry in October 2026 to the University of Oxford, in the United Kingdom.

Applications Close: 23:50 NZST, Tuesday 01 August 2025

Reference Deadline: 23:50 NZST, Thursday 05 August 2025

Am I applying to the right constituency/region?

- **What is a Rhodes constituency?** A constituency is a country, a group of countries, and/or territories, regions or states, grouped together for the purposes of administering scholarships.
- If you only have a connection to one [Rhodes constituency](#) and you meet the eligibility criteria below, you can apply to the Rhodes Scholarship for that constituency following the process outlined in this document.
- If you have connections to more than one [Rhodes constituency](#) and meet the eligibility criteria for more than one constituency, you should apply to the one that you have the greatest connection to. Once you have chosen your constituency you should read the Information for Candidates and then apply as usual.
- If you have strong and demonstrable connections to **two or more** [Rhodes Constituencies](#) but do not meet all of the eligibility criteria for any of them, you *may* be eligible to apply for **inter-jurisdictional consideration**. Please visit the '[Applying for Inter-Jurisdictional Consideration](#)' page for more details about this as you will need to follow a slightly different process. Please note that while some eligibility criteria are waived for inter-jurisdictional candidates, this does not include the age or academic achievement criteria.
- If you cannot see your country or region listed in the list of Rhodes constituencies ([see list here](#)) and you are not eligible to apply for inter-jurisdictional consideration, you may be able to apply for a Global Scholarship. Please visit our [website](#) to check if you meet the Global eligibility criteria.

Eligibility Criteria

- **Nationality/citizenship:** On 1 August in the year of application you must hold New Zealand citizenship or hold a New Zealand Permanent Resident Visa. Applications from refugees/asylum seekers currently residing in New Zealand will also be considered in this constituency.
- **Residency:** By 1 August in the year of application you must have spent at least five of the previous ten years in New Zealand.
- **Age:** You must meet either of the below criteria:
 - i. You must be aged 18-24 on 1st October 2025 (i.e. you must have been born after 1 October 2000 and before 2 October 2007).
 - OR (for older candidates who completed their first undergraduate degree later than usual)
 - ii. You must be under the age of 27 on 1st October 2025 (i.e. have been born after 1 October 1998) AND you must also have completed your first undergraduate degree on or after 1 October 2024*.

A first degree for this purpose is the earliest of:

- Any bachelors degree (including conjoint bachelors degrees once the requirements of both degrees have been met).
- Any bachelors degree (including conjoint bachelors degrees once the requirements of both degrees have been met) with honours when the honours year is integral to the bachelors qualification e.g. BE(Hons) or LLB(Hons). Note that an honours degree that is intercalated within another degree (e.g. BHSc(Hons) within MBChB) is not considered a first degree for these purposes.
- The equivalent of these degrees from a non-New Zealand university

* A university's policy determines the date of completion of academic requirement for a degree and this may be different from when a degree is considered awarded by the university or the date of a graduation ceremony. In ambiguous cases, the decision of the National Secretary is final.

- **Academic achievement:** You must have completed, or expect to complete by July 2026, an undergraduate degree with First-Class Honours or a Masters degree with First-Class Honours, or equivalent, unless you qualify for an exemption*. You must also meet or exceed the specific entry requirements of [your chosen course at the University of Oxford](#).

*Exemption: If your institution does not offer Honours in the degree(s) in which you are or were enrolled, or if completing Honours would preclude you from applying because of the age criterion, you may apply if you will have completed, by July 2026, a Bachelors degree or equivalent, with academic results and other indicators of performance comparable to a First-Class Honours degree.

Given the intense competition for Rhodes Scholarships and for places at the University of Oxford, you will be more competitive for selection and have a greater chance of successful admission to Oxford if you have:

- A high GPA (greater than 3.7/4 or 7.5/9 or equivalent), in your degree(s), and;
 - Other indicators of academic achievement, such as awards or prizes.
- **English language proficiency:** If English is not your first language, you must check that you meet [Oxford University's English language requirements](#) at the higher level.

How to Apply

To apply for the Rhodes Scholarship, you must complete and submit our online application form before 23:50 NZST, 01 August 2025.

There is no application fee for submission of the Rhodes Scholarship application form; however you must submit your application online, before the deadline, and we can't accept any other form of application.

You should apply for the Rhodes Scholarship **before** applying for your proposed course at the University of Oxford. Candidates selected for the Rhodes Scholarship are then required to apply for their chosen course via the University of Oxford's graduate application form with support from the team at Rhodes House.

If unsuccessful in your first application to the Rhodes Scholarships, you may subsequently re-apply only once more (and this must be in the same constituency), subject to meeting the eligibility criteria. An application submitted by the deadline will be considered one submission for the purposes of this policy. Candidates may only withdraw their application following the deadline in exceptional circumstances, such as medical emergencies, war or conflict. Withdrawals must be formally approved by the National Secretary and the Rhodes Trust.

You will be asked to declare that your application is wholly accurate and a fair representation of your achievements. You should anticipate that details will be checked for embellishments and inaccuracies. If we suspect any submitted references, transcripts, identity documents or English Language test results are not genuine, or if we suspect material misrepresentation of your qualifications, experiences or achievements, the National Secretariat will investigate. This may include contacting you or third parties for further evidence. If we conclude that you have breached the terms of the applicant declaration, your application may be withdrawn, or, where appropriate, an offer of a scholarship may be rescinded.

The Rhodes application form requires you to provide:

- Your details, such as contact information
- Evidence that you meet the eligibility criteria
- Your education history including your university transcripts
- The course(s) you would like to study at the University of Oxford

- A CV
- An Academic Statement
- A Personal Statement
- A total of six referees

You can find more details about these requirements and the documents you will need below.

Please also note – before starting an online Rhodes Scholarship application you should be aware of the [Rhodes Trust data protection policy for applications](#).

Key Documents:

You will need to upload copies of the following documents. Please note that all documents must be submitted in English. If your official documents, such as your birth certificate, passport or transcript are not in English you must also upload English translations. Please note that you may be asked to provide the original documents at a later date.

- A copy of your birth certificate, or of the relevant page of your passport to prove your date of birth and nationality
- If the document you provide to prove citizenship/residency does not show your date of birth you must include a copy of another document which does.
- An official transcript from the college or university at which you are studying, or have studied, showing grades achieved (to date). For graduates/students of New Zealand universities this will be requested directly from your university. For overseas students/graduates it is your responsibility to make sure that you obtain a copy of your academic record and include it with your application.
- The application asks you to confirm that you have spent at least five of the last ten years in New Zealand. As an eligibility criterion this means actually living in New Zealand, not merely being 'technically resident' in New Zealand for IRD or other such purposes. If you have spent some time overseas as part of a New Zealand degree this may be acceptable. The National Secretary reserves the option of judging eligibility on a case by case basis and may ask for evidence of time spent in New Zealand. In ambiguous cases, the decision of the National Secretary is final.
- A full curriculum vitae (CV) which should include specific details about academic qualifications, publications, prizes, scholarships, positions of leadership, employment positions, involvement in student, voluntary, community or political activities and any cultural, musical or sporting accomplishments. If you have an ORCID ID, you may wish to include this.

Please do not include a photograph in your CV.

Your CV should not exceed two A4 (12pt font size) pages in length.

- A head-and-shoulders colour photograph (jpg format). Please note your photo will **not** be available to the selection committee until after final shortlisting decisions have been made. If you are selected, this photograph will be used on the [Rhodes Scholar biographies webpage](#) unless or until you provide another version.
- Please do not upload documents, certificates, testimonials or links/URLs other than those required.

Support with your application and generative AI: important guidance

You should carefully read our [guidance on the types of assistance you may receive](#) when putting together your personal and academic statements for the scholarship, before completing your application.

Personal Statement:

You will need to provide a **personal statement** of no more than 1000 words.

The personal statement is your chance to tell your story in your own voice: *Who are you?*

Your academic transcript and academic statement of study, your CV, and your reference letters will provide the substantive detail of your commitments and accomplishments, whereas the personal statement gives you the opportunity to make an authentic statement of who you are.

Prompts:

In your personal statement of up to 1000 words, we ask you to address each of the following prompts by weaving them into the narrative of your statement (the word allocation across the three is up to you):

1. *Which Rhodes Scholar quality do you display most strongly, and how are different contexts and people helping you to develop the other qualities?*
2. *What would you like to learn from and contribute to the Rhodes community in Oxford?*
3. *From your place in the world, how will you use your energy and talents to address humanity's pressing challenges?*

Every statement is individual; there is no single, "right" model. For over 120 years personal statements have been diverse and ever-changing. Selectors are looking for an original portrait of you as a candidate for the Rhodes Scholarship.

Guidance:

The Rhodes selection criteria are powerful and have remained largely unchanged over the past 100 years, having been drawn directly from the founder's Will.

In your personal statement we are asking you to reflect on your experiences, influences and intentions through the lens of the Rhodes Scholar qualities outlined in the three criteria: *"Energy to use one's talents to the full"; "Truth, courage, devotion to duty, sympathy for and protection of the weak, kindliness, unselfishness and fellowship"; "Moral force of character and instincts to lead, and to take an interest in one's fellow human beings"*. (Note that the fourth selection criterion of *"Literary and scholastic attainments (academic excellence)"* are evidenced in your transcript, academic statement of study and academic reference letters.)

The three prompts are set within the Rhodes leadership development framework that informs the [Scholar Programme](#) at Rhodes House in Oxford. They ask you to consider your candidacy for and the opportunity of the Scholarship within three interrelated spheres in your own voice: 'self, others, and world':

1st "self": *Which Rhodes Scholar quality do you display most strongly, and how are different contexts and people helping you to develop the other qualities?* – engage us on which of the Rhodes selection criteria you best exemplify. We do not expect you to be the 'finished product'; we want to hear how you intend to evolve.

2nd "others": *What would you like to learn from and contribute to the Rhodes community in Oxford?* – share with us what you want to learn from and contribute to the Rhodes community, and how you hope to grow as a person and support the growth of others while at Oxford.

3rd "world": *From your place in the world, how will you use your energies and talents to address humanity's pressing challenges?* – make this personal, not generic. We anticipate your particular reflections on what is missing in society and the world today. Considering the complexities of the challenges that we are facing as humanity, we are seeking in Rhodes Scholars people who aspire to and will take action. Tell us what you imagine might be your way of making a contribution.

Choosing your course:

The Rhodes Scholarships cover at least two years of study at the University of Oxford and in the application form, you will need to choose a course, or a combination of courses that covers this period.

You should use the University of Oxford's website to find out about the different course options, their content and their entry requirements; a good starting point is the [A-Z list of graduate courses](#). Make sure that you research your planned course(s) thoroughly. You should be aware that once you are at the University of Oxford it is very difficult to change courses, and that this has significant visa implications. **It is therefore important to give serious thought to your desired course of study at Oxford now.**

The Rhodes Scholarship covers most full-time graduate courses. However, you should check our [Conditions of Tenure](#) to find out more about the course combinations we cover, any exceptions and information about additional discretionary funding if your chosen course is longer than two years, that is if you wish to apply for a DPhil (PhD).

You should also propose a second alternative course of study. Admission to Oxford is extremely competitive and we ask all Scholars-elect to make a primary and a secondary (back-up) application.

Second BA:

In addition to the graduate courses listed on Oxford's website, you can also choose to apply to study for a second undergraduate degree over two years. This is known as a Second BA with Senior Status.

Senior Status is the only basis on which a Rhodes Scholar can study for a second undergraduate degree. You can read Oxford's page about [second undergraduate degrees](#) for more information.

For most courses, you apply to Oxford University separately after the selection process for the Rhodes Scholarship is complete, however if you intend to study for a Second BA the process is slightly different. There is a very short window in which to apply for a Second BA, should you be selected for the Rhodes Scholarship. Rhodes applicants apply using a tailored form, which you will normally be expected to return to the Registrar by 12 noon GMT on the first Friday in December. Candidates who are firm in their choice of a second BA may wish to maximise their admission chances by applying directly via [UCAS](#). If you miss both the UCAS and the Rhodes deadline for the second BA application, your chances of admission are limited. Any Scholar Elect applying for a Second BA will be expected to submit at least one application for a graduate degree.

Whilst we advise you to research & consider your choices thoroughly, we understand it is hard to be completely confident about your choice of course and the choices you make in the Rhodes application form are not binding. In some cases, the course can be altered from that proposed, once selected for the Scholarship.

DPhil or MSc by research candidates: a number of Oxford departments recommend that applicants make contact with potential research supervisor(s) before submitting an application to Oxford. Advice on contacting potential supervisors in advance of your application is course-specific and you should follow the guidance found on the individual [course pages](#), most often on the How to Apply tab.

Taught Master's candidates: please note that Oxford faculty members do not normally correspond with applicants, unless explicitly stated on the course page.

Academic Statement of Study:

You will need to write an academic statement of no more than 350 words.

One of the reasons we ask for an academic statement is that entry to the University of Oxford is becoming ever more competitive and, should you win a Rhodes Scholarship, you will have to submit your application to Oxford within a very short timeframe. Researching and writing this statement will help you prepare for that. Rhodes selectors will use the statement to assess whether you will thrive academically in one of the most competitive graduate environments in the world. The academic statement of study should, in a factual and concise manner:

- i. Tell us your reasons for wishing to study at the University of Oxford, what your chosen course(s) of study is (are), and how this fits into your academic trajectory. Furthermore, you may wish to explain how you hope to be stretched academically at the University of Oxford, and any academic support you imagine might be helpful.
- ii. Demonstrate that you are able to, at a minimum meet or exceed the specific entry and other academic requirements of the course(s) you have chosen. Tell us how you are prepared for the course(s) academically and otherwise.
- iii. If you wish to undertake a DPhil, provide a brief outline of your proposed research area, how it contributes to your future career plans, and list both the Department in which you propose to undertake your research and one or more researchers with whom you would like to work in Oxford.

It is a good idea to discuss your proposed course of study and your academic statement with your academic mentors and/or professors or lecturers in the subject area, and, if possible, with someone who has knowledge of UK universities.

References

You will need to provide a list of **six** people (your referees) who are willing to submit references on your behalf. Please make sure that you ask their permission before listing them as referees.

- **Academic Referees:** Three of your referees should be academics who have formally taught and graded you in your undergraduate (or, if relevant, postgraduate) studies and who can comment in detail on your academic ability and how well they think you would fare at Oxford. In addition to uploading a reference, your academic referees will be asked a small number of additional questions, including a request to provide an estimated class ranking. Note – for successful Rhodes Scholarship applicants, these references can later be used to form part of the application to study at the University of Oxford, so it is important that you and your referees bear this in mind.
- **Character Referees:** You will also need three character referee(s) who should write about your character and involvement in extra-curricular, service or leadership activities. These referees should be able to comment critically on whether you fulfil the extra-curricular, non-academic requirements of the Scholarship and who can speak in detail to your character.
- You should forward the [Guidance for Referees](#) to your referees. This includes key instructions for your referees on what they will need to write about in their letter.
- Once your referees have agreed to provide a reference for you, you will need to register their names and email addresses in the application form. They will then receive an automatically-generated email request for a reference. This email will include a link to our reference form where they will also be asked to provide their contact details for verification purposes and be able to upload or type in their letter of reference **which will remain confidential**. Please note that your referees may be contacted for further information.
- You should ensure that you register your referees within the application form early, to allow them sufficient time to provide a detailed reference letter. **It is your responsibility to ensure that referees submit their references online before 23:50 NZST, 05 August 2025.** You can track the progress of their references within the application form.
- Remember, a good referee is someone who knows you well, rather than a well-known person who only knows you superficially. Please note that Rhodes Scholarship referees should not normally be personal friends, peers or relatives, or have any other conflict of interest. If a referee fits into one of these categories, they should make the connection clear within the reference.
- You should choose reliable people who are likely to respond to your request for a detailed reference, as their letters will be crucial to your application. If you do not have the minimum number of required references, your application may not be considered by the Selection Committee.

Selection Process and timeline

Once the application deadline has passed, all submitted applications will be considered as part of our selection process. This varies slightly according to which constituency you are applying in but below are the key stages:



Selection Conditions

- Selection for the Rhodes Scholarship is made without regard to financial means.
- Selection for the Rhodes Scholarship is made without regard to marital status, race, ethnic origin, colour, gender, religion, sexual orientation, social background, disability, caste or other irrelevant distinction. The provision of such information in the 'Equity and Inclusion' section of the application form is optional, but helps us to ensure that our selection processes are fair and that our outreach efforts are effective. The information you provide will not form part of your application and is only shared with those involved in selection in an anonymized format after scholarships have been awarded. If you disclose a disability and/or request additional support at interview stage, your answers for this section may be shared with the National Secretary, who may contact you to discuss and confirm your requested arrangements for support or suitable alternatives during the selection process. Any requests made will not affect shortlisting, or the progress of your application, in any way. If your application is successful and you become a Rhodes Scholar, this information may be shared with our student support team, who will help support you during your time at Oxford.

- Applications submitted for the Rhodes Scholarship in 2025 are for entry to the University of Oxford in October 2026; the scholarship cannot be brought forward or deferred to a later academic year.
- No selection will be made if a sufficiently qualified candidate cannot be found.
- The decision of the Selection Committee is final.
- The Rhodes Scholarship is confirmed only upon successful admission to the University of Oxford.
- The Rhodes Trust may contact you some time after the submission deadline to ask for feedback on the application process and any interactions you have had with the Rhodes Trust staff and volunteers.
- An offer of another scholarship does not preclude you from being considered for a Rhodes Scholarship, but you cannot hold another substantial scholarship in conjunction with a Rhodes Scholarship. You must advise the National Secretary if you have been offered another scholarship.

Post-Selection

If you are selected for the Rhodes Scholarship you will need to apply to the University of Oxford very soon after selection and the team at Rhodes House will be on hand to support you with the application process. We advise you to prepare as much as possible in advance for your application to Oxford. Rhodes House has access to your entire Rhodes Scholarship application, and your references may be re-used, if appropriate, to support your application to the University of Oxford.

Full details will be given to you upon selection, however candidates who intend to apply for courses in the Medical Sciences, or research degrees in Computer Science and/or Engineering should note that the graduate application **deadline now usually falls in the first few days of December**. You are advised to check the course page of your preferred course(s) carefully and to note the deadline well in advance.

Thank you for your willingness to serve as a referee for an applicant for the Rhodes Scholarship. References form a crucial part of the selection process, and your reference could make the difference to an applicant's success. The following notes are intended to serve as a guide as you write your reference.

Background Information

The Rhodes Scholarship programme is the oldest (established 1903), and perhaps the most prestigious, international scholarship in the world. Administered by the Rhodes Trust in Oxford, the programme offers over 100 fully-funded Scholarships each year for postgraduate study at the University of Oxford in the United Kingdom - one of the world's leading universities. Rhodes Scholarships are for young leaders of outstanding intellect and character who are motivated to engage with global challenges and are committed to the service of others. They show promise of becoming value-driven, principled leaders for the world's future, wherever their careers might take them, and in any field. The selection criteria for the scholarship are as follows:

- **Academic excellence:** the University of Oxford is one of the most competitive graduate environments in the world and applicants must meet or exceed the entry requirements of their chosen course. (candidates will have a greater chance of successful admission if they have a GPA of 7.5/9 or higher, or a First Class Honours, or GPA of 3.70/4.00 or higher, or equivalent).
- **Energy to use their talents to the full** (as demonstrated by success in areas such as sports, music, debate, dance, theatre, and artistic pursuits, including where teamwork is involved).
- **The Virtues:** truth, courage, devotion to duty, sympathy for and protection of the weak, kindliness, unselfishness and fellowship.
- **Moral force of character and instincts to lead**, and to take an interest in their fellow human beings.

Writing Your Letter of Recommendation

You should consider the below points when writing your letter:

- The Selection Committee will have a copy of the applicant's university academic transcript, curriculum vitae, and their academic and personal statements. We would welcome any observations you have which would enhance the Committee's understanding of these documents.
- A brief introduction to yourself would be helpful, including any connections that you have with the Rhodes Trust, Rhodes Scholars and the University of Oxford (such connections are certainly not necessary).
- Where you are able, you should comment on how the applicant demonstrates the four selection criteria outlined above. While proven academic excellence is the first quality listed, the other criteria are equally important.
- It is not expected that you will be able to speak from first-hand knowledge of all of the applicant's qualifications.
- Please speak of the applicant's limitations as well as strong points. We do not expect applicants to be the 'finished product' and we are interested to learn how they intend to evolve. Committees tend naturally to be dubious of hyperbole and appraisals that imply a given individual has no limitations. Your reply will, of course, be treated as strictly confidential by the Selection Committee.

Rhodes Scholarship reference letters are confidential and you should not share them with applicants.

References must be written in English and your comments should not exceed two A4 or letter size pages (minimum 10 point type).

Applicants for the Rhodes Scholarships are asked to seek both character and academic references. The reference form will clarify which type of reference you have been asked to submit.

Academic referees:

If you are primarily acquainted with the candidate through a teacher/student relationship, it is expected that your reference will concentrate primarily on academic quality and potential, although your assessment of other qualities will be welcomed. A Rhodes Scholar will undertake postgraduate study at Oxford, a taught or research degree, or a second undergraduate degree with senior status (over two years). In all cases, entry to Oxford is very competitive and so please consider whether the applicant is prepared for their chosen course of study at one of the most competitive graduate environments in the world.

Academic referees should note that, in the case of a successful applicant, your letter will be used by Oxford departments and colleges for determining the applicant's academic case for admission to postgraduate study. Consequently, a detailed assessment of the candidate's academic qualifications and suitability to undertake Master's / doctoral level study at Oxford will be very important. You are specifically asked to comment on:

- a) The applicant's relative academic standing in comparison with other students on the same course at the same institution – e.g. top 1%, 3%, 5%, 10%, 25%?
- b) How many students are in the applicant's year group on their programme of study, i.e. with how many students are you comparing the applicant?
- c) On what basis are you making the assessment - personal assessment/official class rank?

It can also be useful for Oxford application purposes for academic referees to comment on candidates' motivation, their ability to work in a group environment, and, for those considering research degrees, their aptitude for sustained individual and self-motivated investigation.

Character referees:

If you are better acquainted with the applicant through non-academic interests, it is expected that you will concentrate on assessment of character and non-academic qualities, in the knowledge that the Committee is looking for scholars who show promise of outstanding achievement in later life. With reference to the selection criteria above, please pay particular attention to the following:

- energy to use their talents to the full;
- truth, courage, devotion to duty, sympathy for and protection of the weak, kindliness, unselfishness and fellowship;
- moral force of character and instincts to lead

Submitting Your Letter of Recommendation

- When an applicant has registered your details in the application form, you will receive an auto-generated email, which will contain a link to the online reference form where you will be able to upload your reference letter. The form will also include questions requesting basic information about yourself and your relationship to the applicant.
- All letters of recommendation should be addressed to the Rhodes Scholarship Selection Committee.
- The Selection Committee asks **that your letter of recommendation be on headed paper, signed, and uploaded in pdf format.** If you are unable to access an official/institutional letterhead we can, on an exceptional basis, accept references on a personal letterhead that clearly states your institutional affiliation and provides official contact information including an email address and phone number.
- All letters of reference should be submitted via the online reference form. **Please ensure that you press submit once you have completed the form.**

Once you submit the reference form, both you and the applicant will receive an automated email to confirm receipt; the applicant will not be able to see the submitted reference, which will remain confidential. Please note that during the selection process you may be contacted for further information.

Please note that Rhodes Scholarship referees should not normally be personal friends, peers or relatives, or have any other conflict of interest. If a referee fits into one of these categories, they should make the connection clear within the reference.

THE RHODES SCHOLARSHIP : DETAILED CONDITIONS OF TENURE

Studying at Oxford is a wonderful experience! Rhodes Scholars may read for any full-time postgraduate degree at the University of Oxford, subject to the few Rhodes requirements and a couple of exceptions outlined below.

We expect Rhodes Scholars to study at Oxford for two years, this is not a one-year Scholarship. A third year of full Scholarship is available for those who choose to read for the DPhil (PhD), subject to the notes below.

See '[Choosing a course](#)' for details of the different types of courses offered by the University of Oxford. (Note: a postgraduate diploma or certificate is not deemed to be a postgraduate degree).

Two-year tenure

For those who wish to complete studies in Oxford at Master's level, or who wish to take a second undergraduate degree, there are several options:

- **A two-year MPhil or BPhil:** a two-year taught Master's course, with a substantial research element in the second year. (The 2-year Master's in Philosophy is known as a BPhil)
- **Two one-year taught Master's course** (eg MSc, MSt, BCL, MPP): two 1-year taught Master's courses in succession. Note the exceptions listed below, under 'Caveats'.
- **A two-year MSc by research:** a research degree taken over two years.
- **BA with Senior Status** (or 2nd BA): a second undergraduate degree taken over two years, rather than the normal three, see [here](#). NB there is an exceptional deadline for Rhodes Scholars applying for 2nd BA of 1st Friday of December.

Caveats/Exceptions (for two-year tenure):

- The **MFE** (Masters in Financial Economics) and the **MBA** (Master of Business Administration) are professional degrees. Scholars may read these degrees on the Scholarship, **but only in the second year** of the Scholarship
- The **MPP-MBA** or **MPP-MFE** combination is not available (that is, neither the MBA nor the MFE may be pursued in the second year for those who take the MPP (Master of Public Policy) in their first year.

Three-year tenure

*For those who intend to pursue the DPhil (PhD) on the Rhodes Scholarship. Please note that an Oxford DPhil will typically take 3.5 to 4 years to complete and, for those who take the Master's route to DPhil, 4-5 years. In addition to giving consideration to the significant academic project this represents, any Scholar wishing to pursue DPhil must think carefully about how they will support living expenses in the final 4th or 5th year in Oxford. Please see the detailed **Notes on Funding** overleaf.*

- **Direct entry to DPhil:** Those with a background in the sciences may apply direct from their undergraduate degree to a DPhil in the Medical, Maths, Physical or Life Sciences. For funding reasons, you are encouraged to do so (see detailed *Notes on Funding* overleaf). However, the Social Sciences & Humanities Divisions at Oxford require a Master's qualification for entry to DPhil and candidates to these divisions will need to take one of the routes below.
- **A one-year taught Master's course** (MSc, MSt, BCL): Scholars who read for a one-year taught Master's course may apply to progress to DPhil in their second year.
- **A two-year MPhil or BPhil:** Scholars taking the MPhil/BPhil (or the two-year BCL/MPhil route) may apply to progress to DPhil in their third year.
- **Four-year DPhil programmes**, eg the Centre for Doctoral Training (CDT) and the Doctoral Training Centre (DTC) programmes. Scholars may pursue these programmes only if alternative funding is obtained for the final (4th) year of the programme. Interested Scholars or applicants should contact: registrar@rhodeshouse.ox.ac.uk before applying.
- **The four-year Accelerated Graduate-Entry course in Medicine** is not tenable on the Rhodes Scholarship
- **DClinPsych** and other courses requiring employment within the National Health Service are not tenable.

Third year of Scholarship, including detailed notes on funding :

The discretionary 3rd year of Scholarship is only available to those pursuing DPhil, as follows:

Discretionary 3rd year:

All Scholars on the DPhil*, or those hoping to progress to DPhil via a one-year or two-year Master's degree, will submit a formal application to the Academic Trustees for a third year of Scholarship in January of their first and/or second year respectively. In approving the third year of Scholarship and/or progression to the DPhil, the Academic Trustees will be looking for outstanding academic performance, combined with strong academic rationale, in the context of intended career path. They expect, in most cases, that the DPhil will be a Scholar's terminal degree. In the case of progression from a Master's course, they will also be looking for a proposed doctoral thesis which is an outgrowth of work done in the Master's course, in order to ensure timely completion. Approval of the third year is always contingent also on meeting any conditions placed on admission by your Oxford department.

** for those who entered direct to DPhil, subject to the conditions above, we would expect Trustees to approve your third year. This should not be a cause for anxiety.*

Notes on Funding (3rd year and beyond):

The DPhil typically takes 3.5 to 4 years across all Divisions for those entering direct to DPhil. Scholars who take the Master's route to DPhil should expect to spend *at least* four years in Oxford, and nearer five years for those who take the two-year Master's route to DPhil.

Fees:

The Trust will cover the University fee liability as follows:

Direct entry to DPhil: Full three years of University tuition fees;

One-year Master's route to DPhil: Full four years of University tuition fees (1+3 years);

Two-year Master's route to DPhil: At present*, full four years of University tuition fees (2+2 years)

***IMPORTANT NOTE:** *From DPhil entry October 2025, the University is raising fee liability to **five years** (ie 2+3 years) for those who take this route. The Rhodes Trustees are considering whether the Trust is able support the extended fee and further guidance will be posted in due course.*

The University levies a termly [Continuation Charge](#) once full fee liability is complete. The Trust will support up to three terms of Charge in the year immediately following expiry of fee liability, if levied.

Stipend/living expenses:

Stipend is reviewed annually and set at around the mid-point of the University's estimated range of [living costs](#).

For those taking the DPhil, whether direct entry or via a Master's route, the Trust supports stipend for three years. Any Scholar embarking on the DPhil must, therefore, consider carefully how they will support themselves in the final year or more of their DPhil. It is important to note that the funding landscape post-Covid is tough and all funding bodies, whether academic or charitable are under pressure. Any Scholar considering DPhil should, therefore, consider this requirement* very carefully.

*Alternative sources of funding might include Oxford departmental funding (occasional), grants, other external scholarship support, part-time work, junior deanships, loans or family support. The Rhodes Trust will require evidence of careful consideration.
